

## A REMEDY FOR WANDERING THOUGHTS IN THE WORSHIP OF GOD.

... That ye may attend upon the Lord without distraction.

—1 Cor. 7:35 KJV

The words of the text present us with a design that believers as often aim at, and yet miss, as any in the world; and which is so excellent and rare in attainment, that the Holy Ghost even makes two words on purpose to express it by. ... A distraction is a secret wandering of the heart from God, in some duty [of God] in hand.

- I The what—"Attend upon the Lord."
- II The how—"Without distraction."

The matter what. The Greek word for "attend," in our copies, hath a remarkable elegancy in it.

- That you may **be** *fit and ready* **for God's service**, that religion and religious duties may sit *fitly* on you, that you may be *ready* to serve the Lord ... That man is meet [fit] for the master's use that is prepared unto every good work [See 2 Tim. 2:21]. How many choice opportunities for instruction, for reproof, for charity [love], for prayer, do we hazard for want of a soul quick and ready to our duty?
- 2 That you may **be** *fixed* **and** *settled* **in his service**. The word intimates such an inseparable cleaving, such a marriage of the mind to the work of God, that we have in hand [that] can by no means suffer [allow] a divorce. It should be as hard a matter to break off the heart from God in his service, ... as it is to abstract the miser's soul from the world to which it is glued.

**The matter how—"distraction."** ... speaks a quiet, unshaken, and immovable frame of soul, which cannot be whirled about with vain trifles ... [instead of] ascending and communing with the Lord.
