

## The Wonderful Works of God1, III

The teaching of the Christian religion that is offered to the congregation in this book tries to fill that gap, [that there is no work that explains the content of the Christian faith for ordinary people, at a modest size and price, and which is accessible.] ...

I have in view the ordinary members of the congregation who are preparing for admission to the Lord's Supper, ... or who, after admission, remain interested in the knowledge of the truth.

And among them I again I have in view all of the young men and women who are often from a young age already training for their future profession, at the workplace or the factory, at the shop or at the office, receiving education in advanced or secondary school ... and who are being acquainted with the frequent challenges that the Christian religion is exposed to in the present time.

There are many among them who still wholly want to believe, but because of the environment, and because of the oppositions and objections they have heard, it has become extremely difficult to do so. In each case, their confession is devoid of joy and enthusiasm.

And yet, these must return, and they will return, if the truth is rightly understood.
