

More On Prayer.

It is good for the saints to draw nigh to God; it is not only good because it is their duty, but it is a pleasant good when they have the presence of God in it, and their souls are drawn out towards him.

It is a **profitable good to them** when God owns it as an ordinance for the quickening the graces of his Spirit, subduing the corruption of their hearts, and bringing them into nearer communion and fellowship with himself.

Praying souls are profitable in families, in churches, in neighborhoods and commonwealths.

Prayerless ones are useless, and obtain nothing, neither for themselves or others.

Of all the fruits which faith produces in Christians, says Beza, **prayer**, that is, calling on the name of God through Christ, **is the principal one**.
